

Aging Services

Quick Facts:

- Utah will soon experience a population boom in people over 65 years old—in 2008, over 9,500 Utahns turned 65; in 2013, it skyrockets to over 13,000
- This boom will impact everything—from the health care needs of our community to the size of lettering on highway signs
- Utah is the 6th fastest growing state in the U.S. in the 65+ population
- There are 105 senior centers statewide
- The typical victim of vulnerable adult abuse, neglect and exploitation is a 80 year old female, living alone in her own home
- Self-neglect tends to be the most common referral received
- Financial exploitation is increasing each year

We administer a wide variety of home and community-based services for Utah residents who are 60 and older. Programs and services are primarily delivered by a network of 12 Area Agencies on Aging which reach all geographic areas of the state. Our goal is to provide services that allow people to remain independent.

SOME OF OUR SERVICES

- Almost 12,000 homebound Utah seniors receive a meal delivered to their home by local agencies and volunteers
- Almost 26,000 Utah seniors eat at least one meal in their local senior citizen center
- Adult Protective Services investigates 3,415 allegations of abuse and neglect involving vulnerable adults
- 1,900 Utah seniors receive services in their homes, allowing them to live there instead of going into a skilled nursing facility
